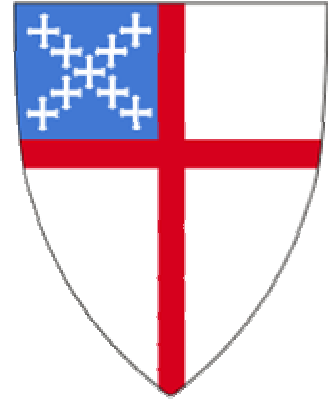

Sunday Worship

The Sunday worship schedule centers around the Holy Eucharist, Rite II at 10AM, this is celebrated for the first three Sundays of the month. On the fourth Sunday of each month, we nod to our more traditional members, and celebrate the Elizabethan language of the Holy Eucharist Rite I service.

Once a quarter, there is a month with a fifth Sunday. On those Sundays, we'll have a service of Morning Prayer with Sermon. For those unfamiliar with Morning Prayer, it harkens back to the prayer tradition of the monasteries in the Middle Ages, and reflects the normal Sunday service of the Episcopal Church during the 19th and early 20th century.

All of our services will feature traditional and contemporary music and enjoy the support of our organist and choir.

How the Boy Scouts came to America

In 1909, Chicago publisher William Dickson Boyce was visiting London. Late one afternoon the city was enshrouded in heavy fog. Boyce lost his bearings in the murk and was approached by a boy of about 12 carrying a lantern. The boy offered to guide Boyce to the address he was seeking. When Boyce produced a shilling, the boy replied, "No, sir, I am a scout. Scouts do not accept tips for good turns."

That comment piqued Boyce's curiosity. He wanted to learn more about scouting in Britain, so the boy took him to the British Scout headquarters. He was so enthralled with what he heard there, that he decided to get scouting started in America.

Churches with a Scout troop, whether for boys or girls, are blessed by the troop's presence. They perform valuable service projects, learn and practice good values, health and survival techniques, discipline, and helpfulness toward others.

Let us offer scouts our gratitude when we see them helping the handicapped, assisting the elderly, directing the flow of church traffic, repairing or painting church property, and assisting us in many and various ways. We all benefit by their presence.

Kumbaya and the Bible

What do they have in common?

Well, the answer is probably nothing, but there is a connection. Recently, the Bible was translated into the language of Gullah (Wycliffe Bible Translators). Gullah is a blend of English and African languages that developed among the slave communities on the islands off the South Carolina coast near Charleston after traders mixed slaves who spoke different languages to thwart uprisings and escapes. Today, there are 250,000 Gullah speakers in America.

The phrase "kumbaya" in Gullah is really just a heavily accented version of the English phrase "come by here" that developed sometime around the 1920's. American missionaries took the song to Africa in the 1930's, where it was later "rediscovered" in Angola in the 1950's, leading many to believe that the song had its origins in Angola.

Here's something you might recognize:

We Fada wa dey een heaben,
leh ebrybody hona ya nyame.
We pray dat soon ya gwine
rule oba de wol.
Wasoneba ting ya wahn,
leh um be so een dis wol
same like dey een heaben.
Gii we de food wa we need
dis day yah an ebry day.
Fagib we fa we sin,
same like we da fagib dem people
wa do bad ta we.
Leh we dohn hab haad test
wen Satan try we.
Keep we fom ebil.

Annual Parish Meeting

St. Paul's Annual Parish Meeting was held on January 22, 2006 after the 10:00 A.M. service. Twenty-nine members attended the event which included a catered lunch. The 2006 vestry, the proposed 2006 annual budget and St. Paul's 2006 Diocesan

Convention Delegates (Frank and Mary Chase) were unanimously approved.

General reports on the finances, stewardship, Sunday school program, altar guild, property, hospitality and fund raising were given. There was much positive news regarding St. Paul's financial state as well as the encouraging results of the recent stewardship campaign. The main highlights were:

- ✠ The pledge collection rate in 2005 was near 100%. This is a very high number for any church.
- ✠ The final results of the 2005 income and expenditures yielded a surplus of \$7,900 to assist in our 2006 projected budget.
- ✠ St. Paul's has received a \$15,000 parish development grant from the Diocese for 2005 and 2006 to assist in our growth and development. These two grants have been incorporated into the 2006 budget.
- ✠ The approved 2006 budget projects to having a small surplus at the end of the year.

Fr. Mike discussed the responsibilities, duties and relationship of a Priest-in-Residence with the vestry. He summarized the history of St. Paul's recent problems and the results of his discussions with members, concluding that the lesson learned from this past history is that St. Paul's needs to be honest about who we are and where we want to go. Then Fr. Mike presented some goals for the near future including:

- ✠ Re-energize the adults in the life of the congregation through adult Christian education.
- ✠ Increase the number of volunteers for Sunday school so that there are 2 adults present in each class to be consistent with the safe church requirements of the Diocese.
- ✠ Have those involved with the Sunday school program and altar service attend the Diocesan Safe Church Training class.

- † Move forward with the long process of correcting the parish register and record keeping to be in conformance with the Canons of the Diocese.
- † Set realistic goals and expectations for the future.

The meeting was held with an atmosphere of positive energy and the feeling that St. Paul's is positioned for growth and strengthening of our extended family bond.

Love is about doing for others. For this Valentine's Day (or any other time of the year), create a coupon book that helps you serve others with love.


Here is what you need:
