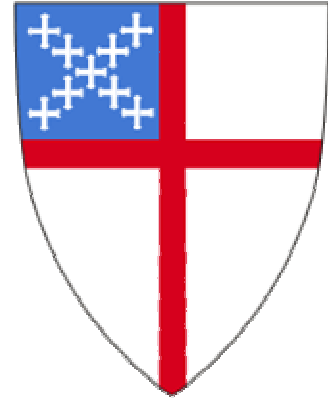

***New Life for Saint Paul's***

*For the past 18 months Saint Paul's has been in "recovery" mode, and has been blessed by God and strongly and affectionately supported by grants from the Diocese of Massachusetts. Some of that grant money has come directly to the parish and has been used to supplement my salary (for which I am very grateful!). Another portion of the grant money has been paid to a consultant from the Alban Institute, the Rev. Alice Mann, who has guided us through a very fruitful time of prayerfully and carefully exploring options for churches our size.*

*During the year-long process of exploration we met the good folks of Christ Church in Medway, and discovered that we have a lot in common. Both churches had a "flowering" in the mid 1960's with weekly total attendance of about 135 at multiple Sunday morning services. Both parishes participated in the gradual decline in mainline protestant churches throughout the 1970's and early 1980's. Both churches experienced "second flowerings" under very capable woman rectors in the late 1990's, with weekly total attendance that approached the marks set in the 1960's. Both parishes are currently challenged to compete with the programs offered by larger churches in other denominations. Both parishes are currently in a financial "crunch." The leaderships of both parishes have come to the realization that our current situations*

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**Assurance of the Ascension**

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## Maundy Thursday

The day before Good Friday is called Maundy Thursday. The word "Maundy" comes from the Latin word *mandatum*, which means "commandment." In the gospel of John, Jesus makes this statement during the Last Supper: "I am with you only a little longer. ... I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another" (John 13:33-35, NRSV).

Maundy Thursday should always be a time of sharing with others, showing loving concern for one another, and partaking of Holy Communion. That is what the Lord asked of his disciples and asks of us.

Garrison Keillor (author and host of "A Prairie Home Companion") on Episcopalians:

We make fun of Episcopalians for their blandness, their excessive calm, their fear of giving offense, their lack of speed and also for their secret fondness for macaroni and cheese. But nobody sings like them. If you were to ask an audience in Des Moines, a relatively Episcopalian-less place, to sing along on the chorus of "Michael Row the Boat

Ashore," they will look daggers at you as if you had asked them to strip to their underwear. But if you do this among Episcopalians, they'd smile and row that boat ashore and up on the beach! ...and down the road!

Many Episcopalians are bred from childhood to sing in four-part harmony, a talent that comes from sitting on the lap of someone singing alto or tenor or bass and hearing the harmonic intervals by putting your little head against that person's rib cage. It's natural for Episcopalians to sing in harmony. We are too modest to be soloists, too worldly to sing in unison. When you're singing in the key of C and you slide into the A7th and D7th chords, all two hundred of you, it's an emotionally fulfilling moment. By our joining in harmony, we somehow promise that we will not forsake each other.

I do believe this, people:

Episcopalians, who love to sing in four-part harmony are the sort of people you could call up when you're in deep distress. If you are dying, they will comfort you. If you are lonely, they'll talk to you. And if you are hungry, they'll give you tuna salad!

- Episcopalians believe in prayer, but would practically die if asked to pray out loud.
- Episcopalians like to sing, except when confronted with a new hymn or a hymn with more than four stanzas.
- Episcopalians believe their rectors will visit them in the hospital, even if they don't notify them that they are there.
- Episcopalians usually follow the official liturgy and will feel it is their way of suffering for their sins.
- Episcopalians believe in miracles and even expect miracles, especially during their stewardship visitation programs or when passing the plate.
- Episcopalians feel that applauding for their children's choirs will not make the kids too proud and conceited.
- Episcopalians think that the Bible forbids them from crossing the aisle while passing the peace.
- Episcopalians drink coffee as if it were the Third Sacrament.
- Episcopalians feel guilty for not staying to clean up after their own wedding reception in the Fellowship Hall.
- Episcopalians are willing to pay up to one dollar for a meal at church.

- Episcopalians still serve Jell-O in the proper liturgical color of the season
- Episcopalians believe that it is OK to poke fun at themselves and never take themselves too seriously.

And finally, you know you are an Episcopalian when:

- It's 100 degrees, with 90% humidity, and you still have coffee after the service.
- You hear something really funny during the sermon and smile as loudly as you can.
- Donuts are a line item in the church budget, just like coffee.
- When you watch a Star Wars movie and they say, "May the Force be with you," and you respond, "and also with you."

And lastly, it takes ten minutes to say good-bye.



### **Note from Fr. Mike** *(cont. from pg. 1)*

*meant that we must try something new if we are to be "vital" and "viable" (to use the language of the Special Convention of the Diocese held on March 10) churches in the future.*

*So we are faithfully embarking on a journey to "do something new." It's new for us, at least. The Diocese of Massachusetts is, again, providing the funds for a consultant, the Rev. Alice Mann, and is also providing a staff liaison, the Rev. Cynthia Hubbard. The Vestry of each parish has appointed members to a joint task force which will work for most of the rest of this year to draw up a charter for a new type of collaborative ministry between our two parishes. This charter will provide for the clergy support both parishes need without draining financial resources to the detriment of the parishes' vital programs. The goal is to lean on each other as parishes, to share resources and programs so that we can each be better witnesses to God's love, and bloom in the places where God has planted us.*

*The long term outlook is still fuzzy, but very hopeful. The short term outlook is a little*

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*more clear, and brings that most joyfully anticipated aspect of parish life—change.*

*When the priest in residence at Christ Church retires at the end of April, clergy presence at both parishes will be provided by support from the budding Hopkinton-Medway Collaborative Ministry's (HMCM) clergy team. Through the end of 2007 the clergy team will be comprised of one full time priest (me), and one "contract supply" priest (to be named). The supply priest's duties will be mostly involved with Sunday mornings. The full time priest will attend vestry meetings at each parish, work with the administrative staff at each parish to make sure the bulletins are ready for Sunday mornings, and work with lay leaders of each parish to see that each parish's programs continue to grow. The details about when the fulltime priest will be in the office at each parish have yet to be worked out. The full time priest will also attend the meetings of the HMCM Task Force and work with the task force to develop the HMCM Charter. I am also hoping that HMCM will be able to provide a Stewardship Training Event for both parishes in the September time frame. The idea is to provide a consistent liturgical presence on some kind of rotational basis for Sunday mornings, and to provide a consistent pastoral and administrative presence during the week at each parish.*

*For 2007 Saint Paul's will continue to pay the salary and benefits for the full time clergy position (grant money comes with strings), and Christ Church will bear the cost of the contract supply priest. In 2008 I anticipate that there will be some sort of revenue sharing between the parishes to support the HMCM clergy salary and benefits, but those details are still to be worked out.*

*What differences will you see on Sunday mornings? At first, there will be very few. Then there will be a new face and voice at Sunday services as Saint Paul's gets to meet the new contract supply priest.*

*What differences will you see on week days? For at least the remainder of 2007, when you call the Saint Paul's church office the same volunteers will be there working on the bulletins and tending the other administrative fires. If you have a pastoral care need, you might be given my cell phone number because I might be in Medway for the day. If you want to talk face to face, you might need to make an appointment for my next day at Saint Paul's. If you have an emergency, I might be 30 minutes away instead of 5.*

*What differences will you see in parish life? As the financial strain eases in 2008 and beyond due to shared clergy costs, you should see funds becoming available to improve the parish's programs. You should also see growth in lay leadership as the vestry and other lay leaders of Saint Paul's enter into partnerships with the vestry and other lay leaders of Christ Church for ministry. You should see the vitality and viability of both parishes improve as the people of God (read that as you) step forward into ministry, and the HMCM clergy team becomes more and more focused on empowering that ministry.*

*The seeds of new life for Saint Paul's are being planted now, and will be watered and weeded as the year passes. The shape of that new life will become clearer as the HMCM Task Force works on the covenant that will shape our partnership with Christ Church in Medway. The outlook for our future is bright and blessed.*

## **Treasurer's Note**

*It's hard to believe, but we've just completed our first quarter of 2007! Easter is upon us and we will soon be consumed with the pleasant sounds and smells of spring. Before*

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everyone gets that far away look in their eye thinking about warm weather, cookouts, and vacations, we in the treasurer's office wanted to take a moment to bring you up to date on our financial health.

First of all, the addition of Mary Arnaut as Assistant Treasurer has been a blessing! She has taken on the position with gusto and is doing a wonderful job tracking the financial happenings of St. Paul's. We are doubly blessed to have a wonderful new computer in our office, which safely and securely stores our financial software.

With the exception of the past month, we were fortunate to have a rather mild spring. For us in the treasury department, that's important because it means we may not be spending as much on gas and electricity to heat the building, and not as much to keep our grounds clear of snow. Let's hope we are as fortunate this coming Oct/Nov/Dec! We have also not incurred any unanticipated 'major' expenses thus far in 2007; we hope for God's blessing there as well!

The other thing we track in the Treasurer's office is collections. You know, Sunday collections, rent, donations flowers, building fund, etc. - oh yes, did I mention PLEDGES©? Now that we're one quarter through the New Year, we should be comfortably close to having paid a fourth of our pledges (for those of you who pledged monthly)

Our parish pledged \$54,476 for 2007 or, on a quarterly basis, around \$13,619 to be "on track". We have actually collected \$12,047 in pledge offerings to date.

We, and the vestry, welcome your thoughts and ideas about how we can be a more helpful organization. For instance, we received a suggestion that we should include a letter of thanks for all of our contributors to go along with the year end statements. This was a great and welcome idea which we will incorporate into our year end statement process.

Finally, it is very gratifying to contribute time and talent to St. Paul's. We would like to encourage everyone to feel emboldened to participate in some way in some of the many different events we will have throughout the year. The spiritual return is out of this world!







# Just For Kids

## Easter Crosses

Make this craft to remember what Jesus did for us. Hang it in your room to look at all year long.

**What you need:**

- Two 8" paper plates (white)
- Scissors 
- Pencil 
- Crayons, paints or felt markers
- Stapler, glue stick or glue
- Paper punch 
- Yarn, string or ribbon (about 10" or 12") 

**What you do:**

1. With your pencil draw a slight curved line all the way across the center of one plate. This will be a hill. 
2. Draw three crosses on the hill. Make the center one a little bigger than the others. 
3. Color the hill green and the crosses brown. Or color the hill and crosses black to look like a silhouette. 
4. Cut out the hill and crosses as one piece. 
5. Color the top half of the other plate with red, orange and yellow to look like an evening sky. 
6. Staple or glue the hill-and-crosses plate onto the sky plate. Make sure you line up the bottom edges of the plates, and staple or glue just along the curved edges where the plates meet. 
7. Punch a hole near the top of the sky plate. 
8. Tie a loop of yarn, string or ribbon through the hole. 
9. Hang your scene on your doorknob or on something else in your room.
